Two unique artists together in concert for the first time

This duo represents the melding of itinerant blues musician Honeyboy Edwards' first-hand musical experiences with the experiences and insights of Fruteland Jackson, a third-generation Mississippi blues player.

Honeyboy's career spans over six decades: the entire period of recorded blues. Fruteland is one of the few young African-American blues guitarists who is dedicated to performing acoustic blues in its various forms. He is working to preserve and perpetuate the

historical, cultural, and musical significance of the uniquely American art form called the blues.

These two outstanding musicians share the essence of the blues experience with audiences on a personal level through a combination of performance, discussion, and workshop. Depending on the interests, setting, and time constraints of a particular audience, Mr. Edwards and Mr. Jackson demonstrate various guitar and vocal styles, aspects and contexts of the music, as well as the choices musicians made in order to play the blues.

These dynamic artists perform their unique styles separately and together.

The union of these two stellar musicians into one performance shows the power and tenacity of the blues as an actual living force, and provides a vehicle for the music, in all its aspects, to be transmitted from one generation to the next. In one show, audiences gain a broad overview of the evolution of the blues while being musically entertained.

Honeyboy Edwards is known as a "walking jukebox" or songster. He incorporates snatches of songs and guitar styles from different regions and periods to make up his own. He is also renowned for his near-total recall of events, places, and blues personalities encountered in his entire life.

After learning the basics of guitar from his father, Honeyboy set out on the road at age 17 under the tutelage of blues guitar wizard Big Joe Williams. He learned the ropes of "hustling a living" from Joe before setting out on his own musical odyssev that took him across thirteen states between 1932 and 1956. Since then, Mr. Edwards has toured worldwide and recorded on

over a dozen labels in both solo and band contexts.

Though he has resided in Chicago since 1956, Mr. Edwards' style remains firmly rooted in the Mississippi Delta. His most recent recording, *Delta Bluesman*, a retrospective of his sixty-year repertoire and career, is available on the Earwig record label.

Fruteland Jackson is a singer/songwriter who first heard the blues played by family members in Mississippi during the 1950s as a small child. This was a period when the music was evolving from a rural, acoustic sound (played solo and Earwig Music Company, Inc.® and Nwafor Management are proud to present

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Fruteland took up the guitar in earnest during his teen years, first getting into non-blues forms of music before dedicating himself back to the blues roots of popular music. His material
